

How to Cite Photos, Graphics, Graphs & Online Images on your Project Display Board

We follow the same rules as ISEF and they are strict about **proper attribution** and about not displaying restricted research materials, so citations must be clear and professional.

Important: Any visual that is not your own work must be cited. This includes:

- Photographs
- Graphics
- Diagrams
- Charts
- Graphs
- Illustrations
- Drawings
- Infographics
- Screenshots

If you did not create it yourself — you must cite it.

1) If YOU Created It

If you:

- Took the photo
- Drew the diagram
- Created the graph using your own data

Then label it clearly:

Figure 1. Experimental setup. Photo by [Your Name], 2026.

OR

Figure 2. Results graph created by author using experimental data.

You do not need a full bibliography entry for visuals you created yourself.

2) If YOU Took the Photo

You must:

- Make sure the photo does not show restricted procedures (especially for biomedical projects).
- Label it clearly.

Under the photo on your board:

Figure 1. Experimental setup. Photo by [Your Name], 2026.

You do **not** need a full bibliography entry for your own photos.

3) If the Image is from the Internet (Photo, Graph, Diagram, Drawing, etc.)

On the Board (under the image)

Keep it simple but readable:

Figure 2. Plant cell structure (Smith, 2023).

OR

Figure 2. Plant cell structure. Image from National Geographic.

In Your References Section (Full Citation Required)

We do not mandate APA vs MLA, but you must:

- Be consistent
- Include author (if available)
- Title
- Website
- URL
- Date (if available)

APA example:

Smith, J. (2023). Plant cell structure. National Geographic. <https://www...>

4 Creative Commons / Free Image Sites (Unsplash, Pixabay, etc.)

You STILL must cite them.

Under photo:

Figure 3. Volcano eruption (Brown, 2022).

In references:

Brown, T. (2022). Volcano eruption [Photograph]. Unsplash. URL

Important Rules

 **You may NOT display:**

- Photos of human subjects unless properly cleared
- Vertebrate animal surgery images
- Hazardous procedures
- Identifiable patient information

Even if approved in paperwork, display rules are separate.

Best Practice for Boards

- ✓ Number every image (Figure 1, Figure 2...)
- ✓ Include short source under image
- ✓ Put full citation in References section
- ✓ Keep formatting professional and consistent
- ✓ When in doubt — cite it

Judges notice missing citations immediately — including diagrams and graphs copied from websites.
